I will be in Tuskegee, Alabama, at the meeting of the American Teachers Association on the weekend of July 28 to 30. I could arrange to come to Jackson-ville on either bunday, the thirty-first, or Monday, the first of August, and spend at least a day in conference with you or two days if necessary. I will have to be in Durham at the annual convention of the National Bar Association not later than Vednesday morning August 3. So you see, the time between Saturday the thirtieth and August third could be used to advantage. If this is agreeable with you, please notify re immediately.

The latest developments in the Maryland cases have been that under the law in Maryland, teachers are on a probationary period of two years and may be released without cause at the end of the first or second year. All of the teachers we have used in our cases have been teachers with tenure, who have been teaching more than two years. However, the counties that have been antagonistic have discharged the Negro teachers who have not completed their probationary period in an attempt to intimidate the other teachers.
